As I am writing this The General Conference, the meeting of United Methodist from around the world, is nearing the half-way point. Council of Bishops President Thomas J. Bickerton has called this a time of seismic shift and a new day for our denomination. There are plans for a greatly reduced budget, and changes in staffing, mission, resource development and advocacy. A large number of churches have left the United Methodist Church. While only about 1% of churches have left in the western states, annual conferences in Texas and Georgia have seen 50% of their churches disaffiliate. The delegates are also voting on changes for a shift to greater regional control of church policies and rules. The battle over the last two decades between the progressive and traditional parts of the Methodist Church had reached an impasse, causing many of the more traditional churches to leave.

John Wesley was passionate about reaching the unchurched, and broke the barriers of class and education that kept many from hearing about Jesus. His ideal was for an inclusive church movement. He famously said, "In things essential unity; in things nonessential liberty; in all things charity." He knew there would be disagreements about finer points of theological doctrine, interpretation of scripture and stands on social issues. Wesley

believed our core faith would hold us together and we could agree to disagree on the smaller issues. This had not always been the case. The church split over ministry with racial ethnic people, slavery and there were branches of his movement that spoke German while the bigger branch spoke English. It is sad when we break our covenant of being in ministry together.


We see in the news the debates over issues of LBGTQ inclusion. This has clearly been a growing issue between Methodists in western states versus those in the southern states. The breath of theological diversity was stretched to a breaking point between Progressive and Traditional Methodists. All the while those who could agree to disagree have been in the middle of the debate and represent the biggest part of our church connection. The disagreement is not this simple. Issues over how scripture is interpreted were also in play. Methodists believe we understand God's direction for our lives through scripture, tradition, reason and experience. This is called the Quadrilateral. Traditional Methodists have moved toward elevating scripture and a more literal interpretation of scripture. Progressive Methodists believe we need to be open to different insights and perspectives on scripture, realizing we come to the Bible with different life experiences. How we hear God speaking to us through scripture is a very important issue. I believe there's room to discern whether our own biases and prejudices are leading us to come to differing views of what the Bible is saying.

As our denomination undergoes changes and our community is changing, we will have some of the same conversations. It has been my experience that this church family has excelled in charity for one another. It is clear we have moved forward welcoming whoever comes to worship with us. We need to listen to one another to

better understand issues we disagree about, but can still come together over the same love for God and one another that we share.
